Referendums rupture the normal socio-material field, exposing the artifice at the heart of all sovereign claims. It is the very capacity to conjure 'the people' that gives a referendum its authorising power: to found a new constitution; to 'take back control'. But this very moment of conjuring can also elicit feelings of disquiet at not being represented, or the institution itself being unable to contain the social antagonism that it sets in motion. In Kyrgyzstan such disquiet has crystallized around the disavowal of sayasat, politics, as a realm of volatile and potentially destructive social antagonism. Drawing on ethnography from Kyrgyzstan, which, in December 2016 held its sixth constitutional referendum in twenty-three years, this paper takes popular opposition to the referendum as the starting point for an anthropology of political refusal. Critically engaging anthropology's predominant concern with political hope, it considers what is at stake for our understanding of democratic disquiet by engaging nonparticipation as an object of ethnographic concern.

Madeleine Reeves is a Senior Lecturer in Social Anthropology at the University of Manchester, and since 2015 has served as Editor of Central Asian Survey. Her research interests lie in the anthropology of politics and the state, the anthropology of mobility and time, and increasingly, in questions of ethics in relation to the beginning and end of life. She is the author of Border Work: Spatial Lives of the State in Rural Central Asia (Cornell, 2014) and the co-editor, most recently, of Marginal Hubs: Conviviality Beyond the Urban Centre in Asia, a special issue of Modern Asian Studies (with Magnus Marsden, 2019).
