# **Remembrance of Soviet Repressions in post-Soviet spaces**

# PROGRAMME

## 21 – 24 September 2024

Warszawa – Białystok – Wyszków

[This workshop is organized to support the further development of the project "Memory of Soviet Repressions in Post-Multi-Colonial Post-Soviet Spaces" (NCN 2020/39/B/HS6/02809). The research hypothesis of the project suggests that the memory of Soviet repressions in post-Soviet spaces is not monolithic or homogeneous but has different facets, dimensions, and textures, influenced by other traumatic experiences unique to each post-Soviet society. These diverse entanglements of memories of Soviet repressions, and their heterogeneous nature, have become even more rhizome-like and arborescent as a result of the Russo-Ukrainian war, which mobilizes memories of Soviet repressions in different ways across various societies.

During the four days of the workshop, we will discuss the convergences and divergences in the remembrances of Soviet repressions across different post-Soviet and post-dependent spaces to agree on a theoretical approach for our research and to select case studies for investigation.]

Does it influence these memories' transformations? If so, how? Is this memory used to antagonize people, or is it employed in the process of decolonizing communities from the influence of the Russian Federation? Each presenter will have 5-7 minutes to briefly introduce the issue. Visual materials and brief PowerPoint presentations that help visualize the problem are welcome. These presentations will serve as an introduction to the general discussion we have within this roundtable]
